

### **Our Mission:**

Called to be shepherds, doing God's work, daily.

To those of the Medina-Streeter Lutheran Parish who have received a faith as precious as ours through the righteousness of our God and Savior Jesus Christ:

May grace and peace be yours in abundance in the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord.

In last month's Pastor's Article we looked at the chapter of David Poling-Goldenne and L. Shannon Jung's book *Discovering Hope: Building Vitality in Rural Congregation* that dealt with Evangelism within vital and effective rural congregations. What we found is that, while there is no one right way for all churches to do evangelism, there is one thing they all share: sharing their faith openly with those around them.

However, in this next chapter, Poling-Goldenne and Jung, lay out a way that in the end may produce effective evangelism without being the goal from the get go. In chapter six the authors describe how many of the effective and vital congregations they researched had a common denominator of caring ministries; that is serving the community around them, both locally and globally, as Jesus served. These congregations see themselves as existing for the primary reason of serving others; acting out forms of caring service and social ministry to the community around them.


The ironic part is, however, that they are not doing these acts of caring service and social ministry for the exact purpose of evangelism; that is bringing new people into the church. As Poling-Goldenne and Jung state, "their motivation is to love others as Christ has loved them" (76). These vital and effective congregations don't participate in caring service and social ministry expecting a return for their service, like gaining new members, instead simply because this type of ministry and service needs to be done. As such, as the popular hymn puts it, "[All will then] know that we are Christians by our love." This type of service may produce such a reward like new members, since people tend to, as Poling-Goldenne and Jung say, be drawn into faith and community because of the charisma these congregations exude through genuinely caring for those around them (76).

While these acts of service and caring tend to focus primarily on the immediate area surrounding these effective and vital rural congregations, by meeting the immediate needs of the community, they also recognize that caring and providing service to their neighbors must reach farther communities as well; nationally and even globally. As the authors point out, "Vital rural congregations view both local and global efforts as important" (77). But whether the community being served is local, national, or global, one things remains most important: to meet the needs that are relevant to each specific community. In our local community it would do us no good to build a well and provide clean water, since those things already exist here in our country. Likewise it would be no good for a community in a third world country to sponsor a safe environment to hold a post prom party if that specific community does not yet have a school in which to hold a prom.

There is a specific obstacle, however, that can derail community care and service before it even gets off the ground, which this chapter of the book *Discovering* Hope addresses. There is a common sentiment that tends to get expressed, especially in small rural communities. Sentiments like "We are too few and too small to make a difference. What could our little church do for others? We can barely take care of ourselves" (79). The truth is if we were to set out in this type of service and care for our community with this mindset, then we have already set ourselves up for failure. But the truth also is, that we already know the needs that face the people within our community, and we are already doing something to address some of those issues. Like supporting food scarcity both locally and globally. Or providing space within our walls for local organizations and activities to meet, organizations and activities that also work for the betterment of our community and the people within the community. When we are honest with ourselves, we find that the size of our numbers is not what matters, but the size of our hearts in relation the size of the needs around us. The bottom line is this. The key to discovering hope and building vitality in rural congregations, through prayer, worship, making disciples, and evangelism all boil down to the one major function all churches in every community serves: providing caring, relevant, ministries and service to the community around us, both near and far. When a church is committed to showing that they are Christians by their love, or by doing God's work daily as called shepherds of

God, as our mission statement reads, then the people who see and are affected by this feel our energy, are blessed by it, and are drawn into service of their own by it. As Poling-Goldenne and Jung put it, "Through caring ministries, Christ is made known not only to those served by the congregations but also the congregation themselves" (81). If you are looking for a way to make sure our congregations are vital rural congregations, then I would invite you to take part of the service opportunities that already exist. If one of the ones that already exist do not fit something you are passionate about, then I would invite us to have a conversation to see what our church communities could be engaging in for the betterment of our communities both near and far.

### **English Lutheran February Council Meeting Minutes**

The council meeting of English Lutheran Church was held on February 3, 2016

Members present were Bryan Behm, Janet Well, Austin Dockter, Tina Guthmiller, Darin Dockter, and Tammy Reis, along with Pastor Ryan.

President Bryan called the meeting to order with Pastor Ryan giving the opening devotions on Hospitality.

Minutes from the last meeting were read. Janet moved and Tina seconded a motion to approve the minutes as read. Motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was presented. Discussion was held regarding counting Sunday offering when only one council member is present, recording the offering on the new form, and the amount needed each month to cover costs (\$6,846). Discussion was also held on the amounts for telephone and Verizon last month. A call was made to Janine for clarification on these two amounts. Tammy moved and Janet seconded a motion to approve the report. Motion carried.

Pastor Ryan presented his pastor's report.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

Tree trimming at the church, fixing the gap in the gutters above the south door, replacing the parsonage mailbox and reseeding the parsonage boulevard were all tabled until spring.

Discussion was held on the Gary Reuer Memorial. Based on suggestions from the last council meeting, Pastor Ryan presented estimates for an ELC sign (to be put up as you enter Medina). Pastor Ryan and Bryan will visit with Leona Reuer next week to discuss their memorial wishes and ideas.

The first meeting of the ELC Endowment Fund Committee will be held February 7, 2016 at 1:00. The purpose of the meeting will be to decide if the money will be invested in the ELCA Pooled Trust, or with another investor. Pastor Ryan has the application to begin the process if the decision is to go with the ELCA Pooled Trust. As the Council representative, Tammy will report quarterly.

Discussion was held regarding ELC's Lutheran Social Service benevolence, which Pastor Ryan estimated to be \$600 annually. The question is if we want to designate where that money should go. Pastor Ryan will get a list of the options for designation and we can discuss further at next month's meeting.

### NEW BUSINESS

The smell in the church last weekend was caused by a faulty furnace in the basement. Ron Headland came to inspect it on Monday after Pastor Ryan contacted him. The whole assembly needs replacement and Ron was unsure of when he could get it. Pastor Ryan asked him to check the other furnaces, as well. Tina will make a follow-up call to Ron for an estimate to replace.

### St. Luke Church Council Minutes – February 21, 2016

Present: Tom Nienow, Clydell Dockter, Estee Nenow, Don Gienger, Lloyd Veil, Pastor Ryan and Robin Iszler.

Pastor's Update: He will be gone Sunday February 26 through March 1. He has people lined up to lead worship on the Sunday that he will be gone.

Pastor did talk to Todd Moos about the sound system estimate. There is not much that can be done to lower the cost of the system and installation. There is a large part of the estimate that is for labor costs. There are several unknowns for the installation process so even the estimate could change depending on what is discovered. The main problem with the system is the CD player does not work and the amplifier is also starting to act up. We will save money on speakers because we had received a donation of speakers from Bob Pestal. Discussion occurred regarding the need for a sound system, if we could use the speakers without the upgrade to the amplifier, and other options. It was decided to do more checking on sound system options including checking with Feist Electronic, Ekroth Music, and Ricks TV. Pastor will continue to check on this. The topic was tabled.

### Old Business:

Streeter Fire Department purchased an AED to share among the Methodist and St. Luke churches. Council feels it could be housed over at the Methodist church since they have more wall space. Tom Nienow stated that the Methodists are planning to provide a donation and the Fire Department and Lyons are also planning to support the cost of the AED which was around \$1700 total. He asked if St. Luke would like to also provide a donation. Robin made a motion to provide a donation of \$300.00 towards the AED, motion was seconded by Tom. Motion Carried.

Flashing on the roof still needs to be checked on and Rich Schulz will be looking at that once the weather is warmer. Clydell will be in contact with Rich regarding the finding on the roof.

New Business:

Change in Janitor Duties was reviewed. Robin provided a summary on the changes. Groups that are using the church for meetings and activities including funerals, weddings etc, are asked to clean up after the activity and leave the church as it was found. Garbage should be placed in the dumpster outside after an activity. The thermostats should be set back to where they were before the activity. The duties will be hung up in the kitchen and should be provided to the women's group and others who use the church. Also there was discussion on annual church cleaning, this was on the previous duties sheet that the church together would do annual cleaning day, however this does not seem to be happening. No suggestions were made on the annual cleaning day. Motion was made by Tom and Seconded by Donny to approve the changes in duties. Motion Carried.

Kids Table – Robin stated that the kids table made from benches found at the church, had to be taken apart because room was needed for the recent funeral. There was no other way to move the table out of the fellowship hall to make room because the benches had been screwed together. Discussion was held on what we could purchase for a kids table so that it could be portable. Estee will check on tables that Menards has that are able to go up and down to different heights. These tables could then be used for other events.

Other new business was fire extinguishers. Estee said that someone told her recently that they need to be shaken up every month in order for them to work. No one from the fire department had heard of this.

No other business was reported. Margaret was not available for a treasures report update. Motion was made to adjourn the meeting by Estee and seconded by Robin.
